

Funerals

The funeral of Joseph William Henry Reader took place at St. Laurence's on 10th November followed by burial in the churchyard. The eldest of six, Joe lived almost all his life in Ansley Common, moving from 159 to 158 at the age of 26. In work a skilled blacksmith, in sport a most able footballer and cricketer (he played into his 50's) and a dedicated walker, Joe was in character a true gentleman who expected a lot of himself, but asked for very little in return. He will be sadly missed by his family and many friends.

We were sorry to hear of the death of Ruth Scattergood, aged 89 years, whose funeral took place at Thurlaston on 9th November 2006. Many will remember Ruth running the village shop for at least half a century, for her uncle until his retirement, and then as her own business.

At her funeral the minister remarked on her remarkable shrewdness in business, her loyalty to friends and constant care of her family and many remember her with fondness and kindness.

On 24th November Mary Carroll who had celebrated her 80th birthday in July was buried with her husband following a service at St. Joseph's Church Arley. She was born in

Ireland and came to England living firstly in London and came to Ansley some 45 years ago. She always took an active part in all aspects of village life and worked extremely hard for all the community.

Pat Tests

The Portable Appliance Test is required on all "plug in" electrical equipment in church and in the halls for the last three years this has been carried out voluntarily by Margaret Oliver who has been fully trained etc, However now her work has changed she will no longer be able to carry out this annual test. The church will now have to pay to have this compulsory testing completed each year. It is not yet known how much this will cost as there are approximately 100 items involved. The P.C.C. did decide that it would be necessary for each individual group to meet the cost of their particular appliance. We expend a big thank you to Margaret for completing this necessary testing. All this testing is required by law in all public buildings.
