

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Our Dear Friends,

It is always fascinating to hear of the experiences of people who have come to a positive faith in God. I find them a help and a challenge. One such account is that of Doctor Mackay.

Many years ago William Mackay was a young Medical Student. On leaving home for the first time to go to Medical School, his Mother gave him a Bible to mark the occasion.

He cared little for the Bible, and soon sold it in order to have money to spend on drink.

Mackay was a successful student and some years later was on the Staff of a large hospital.

One day an emergency case was admitted; a young man had been badly crushed in an accident. Dr. Mackay was at the bedside, "How long have I to live doctor?" "Not long," came the sad reply. "Then," said the patient, "I'm going to be with the Lord." "Please could I have my book from my landlady?" Dr. Mackay sent for the book and continued his rounds. When he returned he asked the nurse the condition of the young man, and if he got his bank book alright. "Yes" the nurse said, "the book is under his pillow."

Dr. Mackay went to see and found it wasn't the patient's bank book at all but a Bible. Examining it very closely he discovered that it had been his very own Bible given to him by his Mother many years before. Inscribed on the inside cover was his own name and that of his Mother. Dr. Mackay went straight to his own room. Speaking later about the incident he said, "With tears in my eyes I knelt and asked God to be my God. Jesus to be my Saviour. The Lord to be real to me as He had been to my Mother."

Sometime later Doctor Mackay became a minister of the Gospel in Hull and wrote a book called "Grace and Truth" which has been the means of bringing many to know the Saviour Jesus Christ. Amongst them Wilson Carlisle founder of the Church Army. It would be a great encouragement to William Mackay to know that his book had helped another person.

We have a Church Library now, and the number of books available to borrow is growing rapidly.

The books have a definite Christian message and can be a real tonic to read. Joyce Allton is in charge of the library. Why not ask her to recommend a book suitable for you to borrow?

I think that some of us may have the idea that a 'religious' book has to be boring (it must be admitted that some are) but those available in Church have been deliberately chosen because they are refreshing and challenging. The season of Lent is traditionally kept by reading an arresting story. Do try it! and God will bless you.

VISIT OF THE OVERSEAS PARTNERS TO OUR DEANERY

Twelve months ago some of our parishioners attended the great service in the Cathedral at Coventry when Bishop Simon launched the Mission in Partnership programme.

Since then we have formed our own parish links. With Arley; and Corby (Northants) visiting us during our harvest festival, enabling us to know them.

In September of this year the Diocese will have overseas partners from Nicaragua, Barbados, China, North India and other countries visiting us. They are coming at the invitation of Bishop Simon. We shall have the opportunity of meeting with some of them as they spend time in the deanery. We shall know exactly who will be coming to our parish in the course of the next month or so.

We need sometimes to lift our vision of what God wants us to be and to do as individual churches and to see what God has in mind for us. Bishop Simon is looking to this exercise to do that and in our meetings with the overseas visitors to draw from their experiences and view of us in the light of their international experience.

The Partners will be in our Diocese from September 7th to October 2nd. We look forward to meeting them during that period.

The Government wants to relax the Licensing Laws in this country, allowing pubs the chance to stay open from 11.00 a.m. to 11.00 p.m., from Monday to Saturday.

The Christian Action Research Education is opposed to this move because it believes it will only aggravate the already serious problem of acohol abuse in this country. The organisation lists the following statistics as an indication of the size of the problem.

25,000 premature deaths each year are related to drinking; 1,000 young people die in accidents where drink is a factor; In 20% of cases of child abuse alcohol and heavy drinking have been identified as a stress factor:

45% of voilent crimes have a drink-related element;

1 in 3 drivers killed on the road are above the legal limit; 740% more offences of drunkenness by under 18's in the last thirty years—3,974 in 1984;

£2 billion lost to the economy is the estimated cost of alcohol abuse:

80% of all deaths from fire are drink-related.

In the light of these facts the Royal College of Psychiatrists states: "There should be no further relaxation of the broad range of Licensing provisions."
