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Our Dear Friends,

One of my many pleasant pieces of work is the conducting of a marriage service. It is always a tonic to see the happiness that such an event creates within the lives not only of the couple involved but also in the lives of the very many relatives and friends it brings together: Some of whom have not met for years, and others who have never met before. It is also true to say that a marriage brings happiness to the local community even though they be not directly involved.

The marriage service is a public affair stating unashamedly in front of everyone their choice of life partner from that day forward; And, if held in a building dedicated to Christian Worship, the ceremony is (ideally) admitting the need of God's help, blessing and authority.

But it is common knowledge that at least one marriage in three in Britain today now ends in divorce. That means of course that out of every three couples who pledge their word to each other in a haze of happiness for all concerned, one couple is going to cause a great deal of pain and sorrow; not only to themselves and families but also to the community in which they live. As the coming together brings joy so the tearing apart brings anguish.

Perhaps amongst the many reasons for divorce is that we have grown up in an environment where everything is instant and automatic. So many things in our lives are press-button. We look for instant marriage and grow impatient when things don't go our own way. A marriage, like a tree, may take years to develop; patience allows a marriage to grow roots.

An increasing number of couples are choosing to live together in a trial marriage reationship first to see if it works. Many, having tried this route realise that it is a false move that lacks wisdom.

Love means surrender, trust, kindness, patience all of which is missing in a trial marriage.

Living together without the "surrender" terms involved in the marriage promise means leaving the door open for escape if things don't work out right. But personalities cannot be handled like that. It is just a cheap alternative that creates far more emotional and psychological problems than "no strings attached" solves.

To be loved is the need every human being has. That means, to be wanted, cared for, listened to, accepted and understood; and

that is absent in a relationship which is too easy, on trial or

Today many carry a burden of guilt because of failure in relationships. The Christian message has the answer to that problem. It is simply repentance and forgiveness, then God gives the grace to lift the head high and start again.

# From a Missionary in Kenya with the Mission Aviation Fellowship GOD'S POWER

'I couldn't wait. I **owed** something to God for saving me,' smiled Gabriel, competing with the bleating goats as he told me of God's power. 'It was in prison that I heard preaching from John's Gospel, and the Lord saved me.'

I sat on a rough stool, enjoying the evening breeze high on a mountainside at Ulaula, listening entranced to this eager Rendille Christian.

When I was released, I told the bishop I wanted to do Christian work. He said I must wait. But I couldn't wait. Jesus said "Go and preach," so I chose to obey.'

And the wonderful result of Gabriel's obedience surrounded me. His whole village of ninety people is now Christian. And the bishop returned to find a new, living church!

I marvelled at this tall man, dressed in a long skirt, and with a huge hole in his ear lobe. In a culture so different from mine, he is God's chosen evangelist.

'Now I go to Kargi to preach,' Gabriel continued, 'It's two days walk, so I sleep on the roadside. They want to hear the Word of God too. Three hundred come to listen.'

I was humbled as I pondered how wonderfully God had taken a prisoner and so filled his life that he chose to work without pay and sleep on bare ground for the joy of telling others about Jesus.

Suicide Kills 1,100 people a day worldwide—one every eighty seconds. In Britain that is 4,304 a year (ninety three a week)—one every two hours.

Suicide attempts are probably running at 200,000 per year—one every two and a half minutes. Overdoses are the principle cause for admission to acute medical beds in hospital.

The suicide rate nationally has come down by one-third since 1964, the year when the Samaritans national organisation was formed.
