

Holy Week and Easter

We start April with **Palm Sunday** celebrating the Triumphal Entry into Jerusalem when the congregation of St John's travel to St. Laurence for one of our joint services. I was listening to the Radio and they were discussing some of the really mad Health & Safety Regulations, but in fact the man from that organisation said most of those mentioned are not from them. There was one which wanted to ban hot coffee from coffee mornings, as children might get burnt, and he thought this was ludicrous and only needed common sense. This made me wonder how we ever lived to grow up in Camp Hill Road. We were surrounded by deep quarries, some of which were still in use and some not; in our kitchen we had an open fire with the kettle always on; we had a fireguard not fixed to the wall; we had flat irons which were also heated on the fire and we have a copper with a fire underneath to do the washing and heat the water, together with five children or seven if we were all there. We took picnics off into fields and woods, except we were not allowed near Stubb's Pool or the unused quarry; we climbed trees, built camps in the hedges; drank from streams – in fact we have real freedom. However, I must agree that we live in much more dangerous times, where children can no longer drink from streams; they cannot go on picnics because there are so many dangerous people around, but I am so glad we were able to enjoy our freedom and are left with many happy memories.

Have you ever wondered how different areas get their nicknames, e.g. we call people from Liverpool 'Scousers'. Well apparently there is a meat and vegetable stew which is traditional in Liverpool called 'Scouse'. This was a Norwegian name for a popular stew, called labskaus or lobscouse among Scandinavian sailors. They brought it to Liverpool where the name was shortened to skaus or scouse, and this led to all sailors becoming known was 'scousers' and the name soon spread to all Liverpudlians.

I was reading an article where the writer was talking about today's fashions and what a difference there is, mainly in casual clothes. He said that when he was young the men wore suits, ties and hats most of the time. My Dad wore a cloth cap for work and a trilby on weekends, and he blew away the myth that wearing a hat causes baldness, as he had a lovely thick head of hair until the day he died. In fact, no man ever wore a football shirt, unless he was playing in a football team and there were very few men who wore casual clothes. My Dad never owned a pair of shorts or a casual shirt and my mother wore lisle stockings all the year round. The arrival of Jeans and T-shirts completely changed the way we dress, but sometimes I wish there was more elegance.

Those of us of a certain age remember the song 'When April showers they come your way; they bring the flowers that bloom in May'. So if it's raining have no regrets because it isn't raining rain you know, it's raining Violets' How very true of April, my favourite month, because it is a month of promise but also when we think of new life, our Lord's resurrection and His promise to us that seed time and harvest will never fail, and we can now see His promise coming true.
