

Our Dear Friends.

If you are amongst the thirty or so people in the parish who read the 'Our Daily Bread' notes you will recall the story of the man who had a guilty conscience because he hadn't filled in his income tax form honestly so he wrote them a letter which read, "I haven't been able to sleep because last year when I filled in my income tax form I deliberately misrepresented my income so I am enclosing a cheque and if I still can't sleep I'll send you the remainder next month!"

I guess that the person in question had an attitude to money which is common to all of us; we just simply want to keep it to spend on ourselves.

The 24th of this month marks the 250th Anniversary of John Wesley's conversion to Jesus Christ. This outstanding personality of the 18th century travelled all over the country on horseback as Christ's ambassador and whose anointed preaching brought a religious revival to our land. His attitude to money was remarkable. At the commencement of his work he earned £50 per year. During his life time his salary increased dramatically. Before his death at the age of 88 years it was said that he still spent the same amount of money on himself as he had done at the beginning and every increase of income he always gave away. He did not want to appear before his Maker with more money than he needed to live simply.

Every age is different and to every person life presents its challenge which can either be taken up or ignored. In our own parish we have a Gift Day on Sunday, June 12th. The idea of this day is that it gives us an opportunity to give in addition to our regular weekly giving. We are needing a replacement boiler. To reach our target of £1000 will mean an early decision on the choice of boiler we have.

For some years now Charities are able to receive a rebate from the Inland Revenue for money given regularly over a period of four years. At present the arrangements are that for every £1 given to Charity, (the church is amongst the many charities in our land) 36p can be claimed. So if you pay income tax you can enter into a four year agreement to give say, 50p per week; (and many give more). That amounts to £25 per year. The Inland Revenue give back to the Charity £9 per year. More people doing this means extra income to meet not only the weekly expenses of running the Church but also being able to meet the cost of repairs and improvements.

Let me list some of the repairs. The death watch beetle in the timbers of the nave, north isle and tower needs urgent attention, as also does the split in one of the nave beams. Inspection of the south wall timbers may also reveal the need for urgent work. Rewiring and re-positioning the nave lights is essential. The stonework of the tower must soon be attended to. We must also

accept the challenge that the future presents to us by facing the need to improve the Church facilities such as accommodation for the children and modernising the toilets.

May the Lord guide us in all our decisions,

CLIMBERS - EXPLORERS - PATHFINDERS

On Sunday, May 15th at Family Service we take a new step forward in our Church family life when we enrol the children and young people in the national young people's organisation.
