

Home from Nigeria

I am still not quite sure how I ended up going to Nigeria.

Perhaps it was mentioning that St. Laurence's and St. John's might be interested in building a parish partnership with a church in Kaduna Diocese. If so this became one of the most creative brief conversations I have had. For out of this initial contact came the possibility of travelling with Bishop Christopher to Kaduna, Nigeria. Over the next few weeks and months you will hear me speak of Nigeria in conversations, in sermons and in the church magazine. Here are a few memories I will always treasure.

The ready and enthusiastic welcome we received on arrival. Baggage sorted. All done for us. The drive from Abuja to Kaduna. Massive congestion. No one could enter the capital city, Abuja and to prevent anyone entering by travelling down the wrong side of the road the number of lanes on the dual carriageway leaving the city was reduced from three (or four if you include the sandy verge) to one. The reason for this. "It's the local elections".

Arriving at Bishop's House. There was no lock, no knocker, no doorbell. We walked straight in to the sitting room to find Archbishop Josiah barefoot in an open necked shirt. He was clearly delighted at our arrival.

The words of Josiah's wife Comfort. "Thank you for coming. So many say they'll come, but they never do."

The subsequent conversation. Archbishop Josiah's laughter, wisdom and courage. I knew in a way I have rarely felt before that I was in the presence of a man of God.

The visit to six churches in the afternoon. The notice in one church that warned against the dangers posed by terrorism. The church that would take 20 more years to build. They have been building for eight years and the walls are now just above head height. Whenever they have money they build a bit more. The passionate speech from the minister at a very different church where they are working with addicts for money to purchase land to expand their building as they cannot accommodate all the people who come on Sunday. The reflective meeting with another PCC as they asked us to pass on our thanks to missionaries, especially the Church Missionary Society, for bringing them the Gospel of Jesus and as they reflected sensitively, but probingly, on the problems of the Church of England. As we travelled through the suburbs the mother who pointed me out to her child and said in Ibo white man. I have never thought of that as being a distinguishing characteristic! And finally the church where we were late arriving and found that the electricity had failed and the choir was singing in the dark. Our surprise when the electricity came back and we found that such a strong beautiful, powerful sound came from only fifteen people....

And that is only the briefest of summaries of the first day.

So much to share, so much to inspire.

My prayer is that over the next few months that you will find inspiration and hope from the story of our fellow Christians in Nigeria as they have found encouragement from you. But that is yet another story....

The church looked beautiful, although the adverse weather meant flowers were more difficult to source than usual. Thank you to all who gave towards the flowers and to those who did the decorating. Palm crosses were distributed and a short time of reflection held before the services on Easter Day because the weather had been so bad on Palm Sunday. The joyful services of celebration then followed.

Gift Aid

You will be pleased to learn that the PCC have been able to claim Gift Aid on a total of £16,641 which has resulted in a return of the tax paid to the church by Revenue & Customs of £4160.25 in the tax year just ended.

This sum has been has been apportioned to the different accounts as follows. The General Account £3442.49

St. John's £54.01

Fabric Fund £ £536.25

Church Yard Fund £127.50

As you can see these are considerable figures that really help the church to function. The PCC are very grateful to everyone who uses Gift Aid.

We are aware that not everyone pays tax on some of their income, but if you do it would be very helpful if you could give to the church using Gift Aid. This method adds 25% to the sum received.

The Government are changing the rules slightly this current year to help charities. This will enable us to claim additional tax relief on cash donations. It really does help church finances if you can make use of one of the many ways of giving by Gift Aid. If at any time you wish to know more about Gift Aid, please do have a word with one of the wardens.

So looking at just a few of these words from other languages we see that they roughly have the same meaning in English.
