

Our Dear Friends,

A man who had no interest in Christian things was walking round an art gallery when he came across a painting of the Crucifixion. As he looked at it, he realised something of the agony of Jesus, as He bore our Sins. Underneath the picture he then read these words: 'All this I did for thee. What hast thou done for Me ?' The man was transfixed by the painting and those words and there and then he gave his life to Jesus. His name was Count Zindendorf, and he went on to be an effective witness for Jesus, and founder of a famous missionary movement.

A small boy really loved Jesus and longed to show it. When the collection plate began coming round, he realised he had no money, so he got a piece of paper, wrote one word on it and put it on the plate when it was passed to him. In the vestry afterwards, the people who were counting the collection came upon a crumpled piece of paper, which simply said 'myself.'

Bishop Festo Kivengerc of Uganda had an argument with his wife one evening. Afterwards he had to go out and preach, so he said goodbye and went off. But as he walked down the road God spoke to him-and this is how Bishop Festo described the ensuing dialogue between himself and his Lord. 'Festo !' said the Lord, 'you go back and apologise to your wife.' 'But Lord, I've got a very important sermon to preach.' 'You go and apologise to your wife.' 'But Lord, there are hundreds of people waiting for me and we're going to have a good time tonight.' 'You go and apologise to your wife.' 'But Lord, I'm almost late and someone's waiting to collect me.' 'All right,' the Lord said, 'you go and preach your sermon and I'm going to stay with your wife in the kitchen !' Bishop Festo ended the story with these words: 'I went back into the kitchen and apologised. So there was revival in the kitchen before there was revival in the Church.'

What is the link connecting these three incidents? It must surely be the word 'surrender.'

Now the Lord says to us, 'Go and do thou likewise !' Then in relationships with each other we shall find it possible to be helping, sharing, praying, giving, forgiving, loving, and other practical expressions of dedication. I think that we would all agree that that is at least what the family of Church members should all be about.

God will bless us in this.

PM VISITS PROM PRAISE ANNIVERSARY

The Prime Minister, Mrs. Margaret Thatcher, joined 5,000 people at the tenth anniversary Prom Praise at the Royal Albert Hall. It was the second time she has attended the event in a private capacity; her previous visit was in 1985.

Promenaders waving banners joined in concert favourites such as Sousa's 'Stars and Stripes' and a modern hymn set to Elgar's 'Pomp and Circumstance March.'

The programme also included an unpublished Christian song written by the actress Wendy Craig, 'Show me the way,' sung as a solo by Catherine Fish.

Veteran Anglican clergyman John Stott, Rector Emeritus of All Souls, told the audience that the event marked the fiftieth anniversary—to the day—of his first personal commitment to the Christian faith.

His successor as Rector, Michael Baughan, who is now Bishop of Chester, called on the audience to "come and see" the reality of Christ. "I long for the church to be centred on Christ," he said.
