

# In Search of Medieval Ansley.

What did medieval Ansley look like on the eve of the Black Death; how many people lived there, and how did they make their living; what traces remain of Ansley's medieval landscape? These questions, and others, will be discussed in this short workshop exploring aspects of medieval Ansley to reconstruct the nature of life in the medieval manor of Ansley. We will also look at the lordship of the manor and particular attention will be given to St Laurence's Church, including a visit to look at the medieval fabric of the building.

The speaker, Dr John Hunt, BA, PhD, FSA, FRHistS, PGCE, is a medieval historian and archaeologist. He is a Fellow in the Institute for Advanced Research in Arts and Social Sciences, and a Research Fellow in the School of Historical Studies, at the University of Birmingham. A member of the Centre for Birmingham and Midlands History at the same University, he teaches on the MA in West Midlands History.

The workshop will be held on Wednesday June 29<sup>th</sup> 2011; 7.00 – 9.30pm, at the Church Annexe. Ansley.

I would like to express the thanks and appreciation for all the hard work and planning that went into the Nuthurst Royal Wedding Street Party, not only from myself but from everyone who enjoyed the day. We all, young and old, had a fabulous time, and it was great to see the extended families and friends together on such a happy occasion. Thank you ladies and your husbands .

Over the years I have had many Bee Stings, and occasional Wasp stings, especially since we have so many flowers in our garden border. Every time I put cream on, but I didn't know that Bee and Wasp Stings are so different. Wasp stings are alkaline, so use Vinegar as the acid in it neutralizes the poison. Bee Stings are acidic so Bicarbonate of Soda mixed with a little water into a paste, counters the affects. We live and learn but whether Bee or Wasp Stings, they still really hurt and best avoided.

It was unbelievable at Easter when the Met. Office gave a 'Smog' alert for England, in spite of the Government reaching the levels set for clean air. This was due to very still, warm weather and it was noticeable that the air seemed almost 'bad' at times. I always associate smog with winter caused by pollution, e.g. smoking chimneys in the past.
