DEAR FRIENDS,

HAVING NO HOPE AND WITHOUT GOD IN THE WORLD... ... so Paul describes those in the church when they were strangers to the Christian message. Notice that they were without God in the world. For many God is located in heaven along with harps, clouds, cherubs etc., but Jesus came so that he can be found by us here and now. Jesus says to us, 'I am what God is like; I do the things God does; follow me.'

Recently our television screens have been filled with violence and fear from near at hand as mobs burn and loot in English towns. The surprising thing is that this did not happen years ago. It is easy to reach for an instant solution, the 'short, sharp shock', or for others who follow a Powellite line a simplistic answer to 'send the blacks back home.' Often these ideas come from those who are far removed from the experience of being unemployed in a life that offers little security and no ultimate meaning. So crowds gather, there is aimless looting, stoning of police and burning of cars by those who in Paul's words have no hope and are without God in the world. What we have seen recently is partly our fault, if we call ourselves Christians. For decades we have been guilty of maintaining the past, not to serve the present but at the expense of the present. We ought to be thinking, planning, teaching and doing in ways that speak to today's world, especially the children and young adults who are beginning to see that material benefits are not everything. A small step in this direction will be taken this autumn with a club for our young children (see what Val Whitworth has written in this magazine). We must go on to cater for older ones as well—hopefully this will follow in the near future.

ECONOMICS. . . .

.... is forcing us (thank God) to examine our whole approach to the support of Christian work, not just in Ansley but throughout the world. We ought to be thinking and planning **now** for the future. The old ways of financing from 'fund raising' largely outside the Christian community offer no hope of sensible budgeting and planning. The result is ever more desperate measures to keep the show on the road while the level of the regular giving drops rapidly. At our September PCC we will be considering what the future holds and asking ourselves, 'What am I prepared to do about it?'

THE ELECTORAL ROLL

The Electoral Roll for this Parish is many years out of date and I have found it next to useless in discovering where people live! The church in Ansley is supposed to have a membership of 156 according to the numbers on the roll, but many have moved, and no less than 52 (or one-third) of them live outside the parish. Quite a number of our regular worshipping members are not on the roll and, sad to say, many others do not seem over-bothered about regularity in worship. To be on the electoral roll you have to be baptised and a member of the Church of England or a Church in communion with the Church of England. You must either be resident in the parish or (if you live outside the parish) 'have habitually attended public worship there for at least the past six months.' The Church Representation Rules state that a person may be removed from the roll if he or she is not resident in the parish and has not attended public worship in the parish during the preceeding six months. This does not apply to those who cannot attend because they are housebound on account of age or long-term illness.

The Roll should have been completely reconstituted in 1972, and at intervals of every six years. It should correspond as closely as possible with the active membership of the local church; it seems that next Spring we shall have to undertake a drastic revision! Whatever happens, membership should never be just a matter of signing on the dotted line of the enrolment form.

QUESTION TIME --- No. 1

Can't you be a Christian without going to church?

In one sense you can, because going to church doesn't make you a Christian! However there are at least five reasons which should encourage us and help us to encourage others in regular worship.

- (1) THE FAMILY REASON There is no such thing as a solitary Christian. Although Christian commitment begins with the individual, it cannot end there. We have become so used to doing our own thing in life that we have almost forgotten this. And the times when the church has been strong have been the times when people have acted **together**. The emphasis on personal faith leading to family worship is evident from the Bible.
- (2) THE TEACHING REASON Christianity is a school as well as a family. As we meet together for regular worship we learn more about the faith (and there is no reason why our meeting together for worship should be confined to Sundays!)
- (3) THE TRAINING REASON We receive truth about God and about his will for this world so that we may share it with others. In some parishes in this country Christians are meeting together in order to train themselves to share their faith with others.
- (4) THE BALANCED REASON God has planned a rhythm in life which applies to the creation and to ourselves. On one day in seven, as far as possible, we meet together out of love and gratitude to God and in thanksgiving to Christ our Saviour.
- (5) THE BIBLICAL REASON "Let us not give up the habit of meeting together, as some are doing" (Hebrews 10:25). Remember also Jesus' example; he went to the synagogue on the sabbath to worship God.

But what happens when we get to church? What do we find in our worship and is it real and relevant? See next month's question.
