

## Looking back, looking forward.

I can vividly remember nine years ago. I was, it seemed, running two benefices and fourteen churches at the same time! As well as organising service rotas for the parishes I was leaving, I was also fielding questions about service rotas in Ansley and Arley, in which I was soon to serve. And there were the farewells to individuals to churches and then the final farewell for everybody before my last wedding that marked the end of my ministry there.

It was four months previously that I had read in the Church Times the advertisement for Ansley and Arley. One of the things that attracted me to the post was that contrary to my existing job in Norfolk there was no oversight of other clergy, no management responsibilities. What the benefice was looking for, as I understood it, was a good parish priest who could serve both parishes and lead them into growth.

Of course it didn't quite work out that way. The desperate need for committed, continuing work for young people led to the formation of the Ley Group Young Peoples Project and then - what I hadn't anticipated - there was major building work on six of the seven church premises and I was asked to be Area Dean of Nuneaton-the largest Deanery in Coventry Diocese. I hope through these things God has been honoured. But now it is good to have building work nearly finished. I am also pleased that my term as Area Dean is now complete.

I know God springs surprises but my hope, as we look ahead, is that parish ministry will be the focus and, with that as the focus, my emphasis and indeed the emphasis for us all will be drawing people to faith in Jesus.

May God guide me, and all of us, as we move into this new phase.

## Flower Festival

For this our 48<sup>th</sup> annual flower festival the theme is "Give". In the porch we will be depicting the athletes who "Give" of themselves to achieve success in this Olympic year, and the Queen in her Diamond Jubilee year who has "Given" a lifetime of service to our nation. We will also be depicting our Cathedral which celebrated its Golden Jubilee, 50years since it's consecration with the theme of "The Gift that is yours" There will be 24 other displays which will include "They offered their Gifts" "Gave their today for our tomorrow", "Freely give", "Gave his life for me" "Give to our God immortal praise" and "My peace I give unto you". Each will be depicted individually with every age represented, including the young children.

Preparations will commence at the church as usual at 9 a.m. on Monday 13<sup>th</sup> August with the tidying up of the churchyard, which, after the weather we have been having, has seen vast amounts of growth. We will be trimming the trees and bushes, tidying the gardens, sweeping, weeding and clearing round the edges: any help at any time in the churchyard is much appreciated. This work will continue until the commencement of the Festival on Friday 24<sup>th</sup>

There are many ways in which you can help, praying for the event, a donation towards the cost of the flowers, making a cake, serving refreshments, cleaning, providing produce for the stall, selling the produce, helping in the car park at busy times or stewarding in the church. The rota lists will be in church throughout August please add your name at your most favoured time.

The festival will commence as usual at 6 p.m. on Friday 24<sup>th</sup> with a service of dedication at 7 p.m. On Saturday 25<sup>th</sup> the church and annexe will be open from 10 a.m. until 6 p.m. The Sunday services will be as usual, Holy Communion at 10.30a.m. and the church open to walk around from 11.30a.m. until 6 p.m. when we will hold our service of Evensong at 6.30 p.m. Again on Bank Holiday Monday the festival will continue from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. and finish with our service of thanksgiving at 6.30 p.m. followed by the party in the annexe to which everyone is invited.

This year we will be having Ansley Morris dancing in the churchyard on the Saturday afternoon and at 7.30 p.m. Saturday evening there will be a concert by "Champagne Flutes" This performance is being organised by Jane Kimberley, and will be, as all her concerts, to a very high standard.

As in the past few years there will be the opportunity to put a prayer in the prayer jar and these will be read during one of our services.

At the end of the festival when the displays are cleared, bunches of flowers will be delivered to the bereaved and those who are unwell in the parish. If you know of someone who would appreciate a bunch please let it be known or add a name with the address to the list in church. If the address is outside the parish please can you arrange to collect the flowers.

The proceeds of the festival will be in aid of church funds with a donation being given to the Nuneaton Hospital League of Friends and the Acorn Children's Hospice. It is good to see visitors in our lovely old church and churchyard and we hope and pray they will find the arrangements inspiring, thought provoking and an enjoyable experience. Good refreshments will be served in the annexe, but most of all it is important that we ensure everyone is given a very warm welcome.
