

Flower Festival

The year 2018 marks the centenary of the creation of Coventry Diocese. In recognition of this, the theme chosen for our 54th Flower Festival is "Reconciliation," which has been an important focus of the Cathedral's work since the Second World War. There will be twenty-seven different displays placed around the church on this theme. These will include, "The Cross of Nails," "The whole creation join in one," "Judge eternal throned in splendour," "Amazing Grace" and "Thy Kingdom come."

The festival will begin on Friday 24th August at 6.00 p.m. and at 7.00 p.m. a short service of dedication will be held. The church will be open from 10.00 a.m. to 6.00 p.m. on the Saturday, Sunday and Monday. The Sunday services will be 10.30 a.m. Holy Communion and 6.30 p.m. Evensong. The festival will close with a service of thanksgiving at 6.30 p.m. on the Monday evening.

Throughout the festival, there will be refreshments on sale in the annexe, the produce stall will be in the churchyard and there will be a raffle for a fruit cake. On the Monday afternoon, Ansley Morris Dancers will be performing outside the annexe, weather permitting. The weather for the 2017 festival was perfect, with lots of lovely warm sunshine; so many visitors were able to sit outside with refreshments to enjoy the dancing and the beautiful surrounding countryside.

As in previous years, there will be an opportunity to put a stone on a pile to symbolise relief from a burden carried, to add a flower to an arrangement in thanksgiving for a blessing received and/or to place a prayer in the prayer jar. These prayers will be brought to God before the end of the festival.

This year, as in many previous years, we will be supporting the work of the Nuneaton Hospital League of Friends, the Acorn Children's Hospice and raising money for church funds. Entry will be free, but we do say,

"Please place a gift here, not only to thank God for the joy of the flower festival, but to thank Him for all the joys He has brought you."
