#### Dear Friends,

I was intrigued as to what people would make of the Flower Festival theme of "Time.' Learned people write books about how the Bible speaks of 'time.' The New Testament is full of the conviction that the 'time' looked forward to by the prophets has in fact arrived in history with the coming of Jesus Christ. Right at the beginning of Mark's gospel we read, "The right time has come, and the Kingdom of God is near ! Turn away from your sins and believe the Good News !'

To embrace the opportunity of turning to Jesus Christ is to enter in to new life and the knowledge that God has not forgotten about us and about his world. Someone commented to me that we are often surrounded by tales of disaster and despair on a world-wide scale, so it is a blessing to see something creative such as the Flower Festival and the accompanying music and song at the concert.

Jesus announced a time when our relationship to God would not be that of formality and distance but characterised by a knowledge of the presence of God, in worship and life—'But the time is coming and is already here, when by the power of God's Spirit people will worship the Father **as he really is . . . '** (John 4:23).

God wants us to see him and know him 'as he really is;' not as the pocket-sized god that we sometimes think of, but as

the creator of the universe, the one who gives us the good gifts of life and draws us towards himself.

Many thanks to all those people who willingly gave of time and effort to make the Flower Festival the time it was. The proceeds (in excess of £400) will be divided between the League of Friends of Nuneaton Hospitals and the maintenance of the fabric of our church building here in Ansley.

## MARRIAGE .... OR WHAT ?

So at last the Church of England is to allow re-marriage of divorced people in church. Like all decisions of this kind this both creates problems and solves them. Up until the recent change in the rules, clergy could offer a 'service of blessing' to couples who desired a church ceremony for a second marriage after divorce. This was given only with the permission of the bishop, who usually went along with the guidance he received from the parish priest. But wasn't this rather dishonest? As matters stand, any eighteen-year-old, church member or not, had the supposed 'right' of getting married in their parish church without many questions being asked, their being no statutory provision for preparation for Christian marriage. But someone twice that age, who had been through the agony and trouble of divorce and learnt a lot of lessons about life, was subjected to a 'service of blessing,' a 'second-best,' i.e. the Church saying that they had failed and that if they behaved the Church might condescend to give them something. Divorce became the unforgiveable sin.

It's not 'the Church' that blesses a marriage, it is God; and God only blesses that which is given freely to him. No amount of pretty flowers, smart suits and photographs in the churchyard will make a Christian marriage. When two people marry, they marry each other—the vicar doesn't 'marry' them ! As the preface to the new marriage service says very clearly :

**They** will each give their consent to the other; **they** will join hands and exchange solemn vows, and in token of this, **they** will give and receive a ring.

In this and other parts of the service there are a lot of "they's." The vicar blesses the couple, but it is their responsibility to obey God's will for their life together. For those who have no intention of permanence, the registry office can be seen as an option, but with the proviso that English law recognises that marriage is 'the voluntary union for life of one man and one woman to the exclusion of all others' — but the reality of this definition is being threatened.

If the changes in the divorce law become fact, it will make it increasingly difficult for clergy of the Church of England to remain registrars. For although the definition of marriage in civil law is still 'Christian,' the proposals which reduce the time enable divorce to take place after one year seriously undermine the Christian content. What is the value of a certificate of marriage if it is only a one-year's warranty on the couple's intention of permanence ?

Pastorally one occasionally comes across people who want to make a new start and it is these points in life that people are most open to guidance from Christians and from the clergy who are usually the first to be involved. I am certain that for some there must be the option of second, valid marriage, with due recognition in repentance for past failures. Others will simply use the church as a public convenience for their wedding, and then we must say 'no,' even though it may cause conflict and misunderstanding.

These trends show how far we have departed from being a nation with a Christian consensus. To be a Christian today means an active, living commitment to the truth of our baptism; a conscious knowledge of the love of God; a real commitment to the worship of God, and a lively belief in the personal reality of Jesus for us.
