

Over the past two years I have written frequently about the church's commitment to help our community e.g. supporting new activities for all ages, improving the two halls and seeking to appoint a youth worker to assist the existing clubs and 'fill in the gaps'.

Many of our needs and hopes we share in common - the revival of the community spirit and the creation of a happy secure area in which people of all ages can find time and space to enjoy themselves and help one another. But we all have our own very personal hopes, fears and needs. That is why as a church we are thinking of developing a ministry of healing within our services. The ministry of healing is about physical healing, but it is also about the healing of our emotional hurts and the restoration of broken relationships. There are more people with broken hearts than broken legs. The Christian ministry of healing is Jesus meeting us at our point of need. It is God shining His love upon us to bring restoration, life and hope, wholeness and healing.

In practical terms the ministry of healing can be done in a wide variety of ways. When it happens in church services, people are normally invited to come forward, perhaps to the altar rail. Here two people will lay hands on their head and pray for them. The person seeking help may, if they so wish, speak briefly about their need. Should more time be required they can ask for help after the service or arrange to meet again on a separate occasion. I have found great blessing both in providing and receiving such healing and I hope it will benefit you also.

Your P.C.C. will be thinking about this at their next meeting. Your thoughts and prayers about how we might best help you, will be most appreciated.
