

# Churchyard and cremation garden.

As can be seen the present part of the churchyard being used is filling up and the PCC estimate there is about 10-15 years space in that part. At their July meeting it was decided that once that part of the churchyard was full the part near the main road below the bottom entrance gate will then be used.

The present row in the cremation garden has at the time of writing just one plot left and the PCC agreed to create a new row between the existing row and the previous one. As is apparent the PCC does have to use the space efficiently.

The PCC wishes everyone to be aware that it is possible to use existing family graves where there is space for the interment of ashes. It is this option that is open to people who do not qualify for a new plot. An alternative is to make use of the Garden of Peace where ashes are interred and an entry in made in the Book of Remembrance. However there can be no flowers or stones placed in this part of the churchyard.

As everyone can imagine this is a difficult issue and we hope by bringing this to your attention you will be able to consider options open to you or a loved one. Thus ensuring that when the time comes it will not have to be a difficult one for those left behind.
