

Our Dear Friends,

Two things stand out for many people who come to our church for Harvest Thanksgiving. One is the fragrance from the fruit, flowers and vegetables. The other is the beauty of the gifts that are brought. These two things together make our Church very special at this important annual festival,

'I give you every seed-bearing plant on the face of the whole earth and every tree that has fruit with seed in it they will be yours for food.' These words from the Bible help us to marvel at the scope of God's generosity.

Harvest time is an occasion for thankgiving as the Prayer Book puts it, 'We give Thee thanks for all Thy goodness and loving-kindness to us and to all men.'

Harvest time is also an opportunity for responding to God's generosity as that same prayer concludes, 'that we show forth Thy praise, not only with our lips, but in our lives by giving up ourselves to Thy service,'

This prayer shows us that harvest is all about giving. It is a time for Thanksgiving and self giving. A time for celebrating and sacrificing. A time to enjoy God's good gifts and a time to meet the needs of others.

One of the harvest Bible readings from Deuteronomy chapter 26 and verse 11 says, 'Be grateful for all the good things that the Lord has given you and your family,' and verse 12 adds, 'give to the orphans and the widows so that in every community they will have all they need to eat.'

Harvest Festival rightly celebrated must always include helping those who are starving. But our culture persuades us to accumulate possessions and wealth, Harvest-time challenges that concept, It persuades us to respond to God's love with sacrificial generous giving. For some of us that might be a sum of money, for others it might be possessions, for others it might be the gift of ourselves, or the privilege of seeing our children give themselves to serve God overseas in a third world country or in one of the inner cities in our own land.

It is beyond our comprehension to imagine the nightmare experienced by those Rwandans who abandoned homes and harvests in terror as fighting tore their country apart. Apparently that was by more than half the population. As many as two million people may have been killed. Still more are dying of disease in refuge camps and facing starvation, They need to go home, harvest their crops, bury their dead and rebuild their communities.

Out of our plenty we can help those who have stepped in to do what can be done as a remedy for broken hearts, wounded souls and crushed spirits; and those are the local church people in Burundi, Tanzania and Ziare as they have so gallantly responded to the crisis by sheltering refugees, distributing food and administering medicines.

Envelopes will be in the pews giving us the opportunity to get alongside our brothers and sisters,
