

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## Harvest and Aberfan

Our worship in October is marked by two quite contrasting events.

At the start of the month on Sunday 8<sup>th</sup> October with services at 8, 10.30 and 6.30 at St. Laurence and at 10.30 at St. John's we shall be celebrating harvest and the next day we shall share together in the Harvest Supper at the Village Church Hall. It will be a time of joy and thanksgiving as we thank God that year by year He has given us the fruits of the earth in their seasons.

Two weeks later, we shall gather at the Aberfan garden to mark the 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the terrible disaster. This garden created in the churchyard by the children of Ansley Church School, as a memorial to the children who died. The Old School and Nursery Hill School will be there on the 20<sup>th</sup> October. St. Laurence's morning service on the 22<sup>nd</sup> will include an Act of Remembrance.

At first sight the two events could not be more contrasting-one joyful, the other saddening. Yet both remind us of our responsibility to care for the world and to use the world's resources for the good of all. Vital in all this, especially as the need to address the issue of climate change becomes ever more pressing, is the safe disposal of waste. We look back in joy at the Harvest, we look back in sorrow as we remember the tragedy at Aberfan, We look forward in a shared commitment to care for the whole of the created order so beautifully created by God and so frequently abused.

## Harvest

Our harvest celebrations will take place in keeping with our tradition, the second weekend of October. Although there are now fewer farms in Ansley than in past years there are still many parishioners with gardens and allotments. The weather, this year has again been difficult with heavy rain in May and then a long hot dry spell followed by the heavy rains the middle of August.

We come at harvest to offer our thanks to God for all our food and his goodness to us, everyone is always welcome to our services and especially at harvest. If you have something for which to thank God, do come and join us at one of our services. They are:- 8.00 a.m. Holy Communion, 10.30 a.m. Holy Communion with presentation of gifts and 6.30 p.m. Evensong at St. Laurence's and 10.30 a.m. Holy Communion at St. John's.

Preparations for Harvest will commence with the decorating of our churches at St. Laurence Friday 6<sup>th</sup> from 2 p.m. and then on Saturday from 9 a.m. (We will need to be sure of an good start as there are two weddings in the afternoon the first being at 1.30 p.m.)

Decorating at St. John's will commence at 2. p.m. on Saturday with the presentation of gifts at the morning service. All the produce given at St. John's will be taken to Nursery Hill School to be distributed with their gifts to older people in the Common.

On Monday the produce from St. Laurence's will all be taken to the Village Church Hall and in the evening it will be sold at the Harvest Supper Which will commence at 7.30 p.m. Some of the items will be priced and then there will be an auction of other items after the supper. Tickets will be available.
