

Well, come September and we lost all the warm sunshine, the days got shorter and there was an Autumn chill in the air, and as Autumn has come early people are thinking about putting the heating back on, so when I read the article 'Wheat & Chaff' in Home Words in the last magazine it reminded me of when the chill started at home. We didn't have central heating – just one coal fire in the kitchen; there was a fireplace in all 4 rooms, but I cannot remember the bedroom fires ever being lit and the one in the front room was only lit Christmas Day and then it smoked so badly we would rather have been cold. Also there were no fancy hot water bottles, as we used the earthenware bottles which had contained Ginger Beer or our Mam would wrap a shelf out of the fire oven and we would use that as a hot water bottle, except I was banned from using it as I suffered from Chilblains. However, we must have been very hardy as we were not allowed to sit near the kitchen fire because we didn't want mottled legs. Even now this winter many families will be having to economise on heating so hot water bottles and bed socks will come into their own.

However, as I write this letter the gardens are still ablaze with colour as Summer flowers continue to bloom, even though it is time to set Winter Pansies, Primulas and Bulbs, so prolonging the Summer, and if you watched 'Harvest' on T.V. you can only wonder at the miles and miles of polytunnels used to protect precious plants and trees. One farmer had 3 miles of these tunnels covering Cherry Trees which protected them from bad weather, but even so it is still essential that they have light and warmth from the sun, which we have had in abundance this year.

In September the largest library In the world was opened in Birmingham at a cost of I80 million pounds. It is magnificent but it seems a shame that small libraries are closing and this huge library does not cater for people who cannot get there and need local libraries. It seems that Birmingham had an even bigger project when they bought lots of land in a valley in Wales and built huge dams to provide Birmingham and us with water. This really was a great achievement and we still reap the benefits now.
