

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Our Dear Friends,

Have you ever wondered how many people have lived on our planet? Nobody can be sure but estimates are in the order of sixty billion. With today's technology for gathering statistics, we learn that the world population of five billion is increasing by 50,000 a day, over 1,500,000 a month, about 18,000,000 a year.

The majority live and die virtually unknown, very few have a major effect on human history. Some become world-famous and are household names influencing the lives of millions,

One person stands out from all the rest in such a way as to make him genuinely unique. No other has attracted such a combination of attention, devotion, criticism, adoration and opposition. The words he spoke, and the things he did has attracted intense interest. That person is Jesus of Nazareth who lived about 2000 years ago. The date of His birth is not known, but that one event divides world history into the years labelled "B.C," (before Christ) and "A.D." (Anno Domini. Latin for 'in the year of the Lord'),

He never wrote a book, but more books have been written about Him than any other in history. He never painted a picture, or composed any poetry or music, but His life and teachings have inspired more songs, plays, poetry, pictures and films than any other person,

The World Christian Encyclopaedia calculates that every year an average of 330,000 of Jesus' followers are martyred for their faith. That does not deter people: Today Christianity has 1,620,000,000 followers—over $30\,\%$ of the world's population.

Jesus' public teaching lasted only 3 years and was restricted to one small country; but today, through means of radio and television networks, His message is carried around the globe.

It is not surprising that distinguished historians over the centuries have paid particular attention to Him. In our own day the noted historian K. S. Latourette writes, 'Jesus the seeming failure, has had more effect upon the history of mankind than any other of its race who has ever existed! Man's interest in Jesus seems to be insatiable, inspite of the questions summed up in this one, Of what conceivable significance, for us today, is the death of a Jew in Palestine two thousand years ago?'

The Christians claim that the cross really is the key to everything was once expressed in this way:

The Cross of Christ is a picture of violence, yet the key to peace;

- a picture of suffering, yet the key to healing,
- a picture of death, yet the key to life;
- a picture of weakness, yet the key to power;
- a picture of hatred, yet the key to love.
