

What a wonderful Autumn we have had with lots of sunshine and blue skies. Many people travel many miles to see Autumn in Canada and North America, but you have only to go through the leafy lanes of Warwickshire and look out over the fields to see some magnificent trees in colours of green, red, brown and orange - the flowers also have kept blooming as Roses and other flowers have a second life. This truly is a beautiful time of the year.

Have you heard that Spiders don't like conkers, although it hasn't been proved. This year has seen an abundance of spiders, so we thought perhaps we would put some conkers around to deter these creepy crawlies. We went conkering and placed the conkers around the front and back doors. We will wait and see!

Before the '5 a day' the only fruit we could eat during the 1940's were seasonal English apples, pears, plums and the vegetables were limited to cabbage, beans (in season), carrots and Swedes. When we had cabbage, (which was very often and which we hated if it was crinkly) my mother gave us the cabbage water to drink with a dash of salt - we loved it. We also ate the stalk, so although we hated the cabbage, we had already had all the goodness before it was on our plates, although we were still made to eat it.

I was reading an article on 'The joy of a 50's childhood'. It said that we grew up with memories of houses that were draughty in winter with curtains hung behind the front door to reduce the flow of cold air and frost that formed overnight on the inside of bedroom windows. It has to be said that we were much hardier in those days, as we had never heard of central heating, so to get up to cold lino on the floor and draughts was the norm, not the exception. Then I realised as I read this that despite having double glazed windows, doors and porch, we still draw a curtain over the front door when it gets dark, and we still think it feels more cosy.

Why are there 13 in a baker's dozen, when there are only 12 in a dozen, no more, no less? In the 13th century there was a law called the Assize of Bread and Ale in which it was decreed that bakers who short-changed their customers faced serious punishment, like having an arm chopped off. So, rather than risk such a fate, bakers would routinely hand over 13 items when asked for a dozen, just in case they'd miscounted or one of the items was defective in some way. I suppose their motto was 'better safe than sorry'
