

Sunday 6th November

The morning congregations of St. Laurence & St. John's will meet at St Wilfrid's in Old Arley for a combined service at our usual time of 10.30. Note: there will be NO morning services at St Laurence or St. John's that morning, but the evening service of Holy Communion at St. Laurence will continue as normal.

Remembrance Day

On this very reflective day, the congregation will remember with thanksgiving all those who have paid the ultimate sacrifice in the service of our nation both in the two World Wars and in the many conflicts since so that we may live in freedom. Also remembered are those who

have suffered and continue to suffer because of war, the civilians, the injured, the widowed and the fatherless.

During the special services we will pray for peace and reconciliation around the world and bring to the altar the wreaths of poppies. The two minutes silence will be observed in conjunction with our leaders at the Cenotaph in London, and following the service in St Laurence the wreaths will then be taken in procession and laid at our parish War Memorial. Anyone wishing to attend will be, as always, most welcome.
